24th Annual CPSA International Exhibition and Convention

In the shadow of Mt Rainier, the 24th Annual CPSA Convention in Tacoma, WA took place July 26th to 30th. And it was, my opinion, a success. The American Art Company was the gallery selected for the International Exhibit and was located conveniently just a block from the convention site, the Hotel Murano.





The gallery exhibit was probably the best one I have seen for any show, not to mention recent international color pencil exhibits. The gallery owner had a 3-D art exhibit that was showing at the same time as ours. But the way that she incorporated the sculptures with our pieces and visa versa, made our exhibit seem very lush and rich. Every piece



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had a dedicated light on it and was located near or with complimentary pieces in the 3-D exhibit. The gallery really did us proud.

There were a reported five pieces that eventually sold during this show.

The Judge, Michael W. Monroe put together a great exhibit of CP works and the competition among the accepted pieces was fierce and the winners were well deserving. Monroe also did something that I felt was unprecedented (not to mention very brave on his part). He held a critique and review session of the pieces in the gallery. With an audience of the exhibiting artists, he walked through the gallery and gave a quick explanation and/or critique as to why he chose each piece. A short video of that process was posted on FB by Denise Howard as Monroe commented on her piece. His analysis of her composition was very interesting. I posted that video on our DC 214 FaceBook group page for you to see. And you can also get a sense of what the gallery looked like.

Overall, this was a tremendous show for color pencils and CPSA.

Hotel Murano

The convention was held at the Hotel Murano in central Tacoma. This hotel was a real beauty. Throughout were displays of glass art reminiscent of the glass blowers' art from the island of Murano near Venice, Italy. On each

floor just outside the elevators were exhibits of individual glass artists with one piece of their work on display with a profile and photos from their studios. The hotel was an actual gallery in and of itself.



MOG

Within a short walk of the hotel was the Tacoma Museum of Glass (MOG) with its landmark silver cone. This was a great museum full of hand blown glass art and an in-house kiln room where guest artists occasionally work glass into art. The room has gallery seating and walkways around the entire work area so visitors can watch every step of the process.





You could really feel the heat of all of the open kilns and torches used from the work space below.







The museum proper held a vast array of beautiful and unusual ways to manipulate glass into art. Some of these were extremely intricate and stunning.



Convention Workshop with Kendra Ferreira By Andrew Purdy

I attended only one workshop this time around and Kendra showed everyone how to incorporate colored pencil on and in wooden boxes. The boxes were Clayboard Boxes by Ampersand. They had a clayboard surface mounted on the top of the lid and two hinges (Ruth Arthur's art box shown below).

Kendra introduced us to a new transfer method (at least new to me) whereby a blender marker was used to transfer a toner copy of a line drawing or photo to the surface of the clayboard.



The technique required two things to work properly: 1) a Xerox or laser copy of the artwork or line drawing in reverse and 2) a specific brand of marker, a ChartPack colorless blender. These markers have a solvent called Xylene, which other blender makers do not have (i.e. Prismacolor Blender markers). Xylene can also be purchased at Home Depot and applied with a water-brush or cotton swab. Xylene is very potent and should be used in a well ventilated area. Fortunately, you don't need much to accomplish the transfer.





Once the transfer dries, you can apply CP, watercolor, etc. The transfer works on the bare wood of the boxes as well, which adds to the broad range of design possibilities with these art boxes.

She also demonstrated her technique in mounting completed CP drawings inside and on the exterior sides of the boxes with archival double sided adhesive sheets.

ARTIST INTERVIEW: Betty Sandner By Phil Zubiate, CPSA

When did you know you had an ART talent?

"Like all of us I started young in the art field at school, but really found my passion when I started to draw in college. I majored in Business with a minor in Art. Due to family issues I had to stop

attending college and assist my Mother after an accident. Then marriage and family filled my years until 1999 when I returned to school and the first class I took was drawing. My drawing teacher loved to show our art in the display cases at Saddleback College. One piece we all did in class was a drawing of an unmade bed. When did you begin your art education?

"My real art education started in college."



Who was an ART mentor to you?

"WOW! This question is not easy for me since there are so many. For Colored Pencil Artists, I LOVE Bernard Poulin's work. His portraits are unbelievable. And there are so many in the world of Colored Pencil Artists, I feel I can go to if I have questions and they would be happy to help. I guess if I had to name one Artist from the past, I would say Vincent van Gogh. I love how he makes his work feel so loose and free, since I do not feel that way with Colored Pencil. I aspire to be more loose and free with Colored Pencil."

What other art styles do you like to paint in or draw in? "I like to draw what I like, not sure if it is considered a style but I have tried watercolors and feel that is NOT my area. I also do ceramics and have a potter's wheel and kiln at the house."

Do you need music or some sort of sound to help you draw? "I do enjoy music or the TV on when I draw, unless I am drawing with more than just myself. I like to have others

around to throw ideas around and keep me in focused on the

The 2016 CPSA Convention in Tacoma

Our room was on the 18th floor and we were thrilled to see a great view of Mt. Rainier, the Museum of Glass with its iconic cone shaped "Hot Shop" chimney, the Chihuly Bridge of Glass and the Tacoma Art Museum from our window. Funny thing about Mt. 
DC 201 did a terrific job of welcoming everyone and organizing the events. Thank you to their president, Carol Miller, and her team members.


Using the windows to transfer our outline

We jumped right in and started to erase an outline. Since it was quicker to do so, some of us used the convention hall windows to transfer our drawings.

Tracy demonstrated how each eraser took away color and how he achieves subtle changes in value by rubbing away pencil with a kneaded eraser.

I love working on drafting film and this method of creating a drawing has so many possibilities. Tracy's pieces are in black and white but I decided to add a touch of blue to my recently completed work, "Jay Walking".

I am in love and I have more subjects to "draw" using this technique.

The show runs from July 1st to October 9th 2016 and he will be in the studio illustrating his colored pencil technique and how to use the Icarus board. His hours are Thur thru Sat. 1-5 pm.

The Art of Colored Pencil

The show is about the use of colored pencil to create remarkably detailed fine art and the process I go through to accomplish a nice piece of art that will be enjoyed by all patrons.





I have over 30 pieces of art on display, from colored pencil pieces, digital art, 3D pieces, geometric pieces, airbrush, stippling, mixed media and graphite. The reason for the diversity of art is to show my progression from the 1970's to now and how my

influence and choices to draw come from my travels to even in my backyard.

One of my reasons to show at the Carnegie Art Museum Studio was to allow the public to come and see me at work in the studio and experience firsthand my drawing technique and the steps I take. Starting from the photograph, changes to the image on the computer, a color print out, transfer to my paper of choice and the picking of the prismacolors. I make color swatches with the CP number to help me keep order and steps of layering.



I've started to teach classes and each time I teach a class the students will ask me a different question about my technique and how I blend my colors or the strokes I use or the pressure that I may have applied

to a certain picture. I must admit that most of the questions are about the Malibu Succulent picture.

The best remarks about the show are when patrons say that they enjoyed reading and seeing into my process and how I think and change the photos to make the pictures my art.
